
Good Progress Made

At Monday's Sitting

Splendid progress was the reward for the first all-day M. C. Monday sitting of the 1923 Legislature. A host of bills were advanced a stage on second reading, and one or two disposed of by the death route, including that of K. K. Homuth (South Waterloo) to empower municipalities to hold elections under the "P. R." system.

Second reading was given a measure fathered by H. P. Hill (Conservative, Ottawa) to restore to plaintiffs the right to recover damages, even though plaintiff had himself been, in a measure, negligent; a measure introduced by G. M. Leeson, which would extend the range of church exemption from taxation was killed.
