## DOCTORS' ACCOUNTS MAY BE REGILATED

## Inquiry Into Physicians' Fees Sequel to Drugless Healers Bill

As a result of a suggestion offered in the Legislature yesterday by W. F. Nickle, K.C., Conservative member for Kingston, Ontario is likely to have a Medical Taxing Officer, whose duty it shall be to privately hear and settle disputes between practitioner and patient as to the doctor's remuneration for services.

Mr. Nickle suggested it at the close of discussion upon Premier Drury's bill to regulate the "drugless healers," and the Premier readily acquiesced as to the wisdom and necessity of such an officer. It was agreed that when the Premier's Medical Bill gets into committee a clause to that effect can be discussed

and likely added. Discussion upon the Premier's measure was unexpectedly short, there appearing to be general agreement among members that some restrictions should be placed upon the rights of individuals indiscriminately to practice medicine, and also that there should be some standardization and legal recognition of existing "drugless healing" professions. In urging second reading for his Premier Drury said that "it was ridiculous that a plumber should be following his trade one month and holding himself out as a healer the

next.". J. M. Webster, Lambton, and D. J. Taylor, North Grey, U.F.O. members, both expressed concern, however, as to the effect the shutting out of the Province of drugless healers would have upon the numbers of young men who were now in their second year of osteopathy or chiropractics. The Premier, however, assured them that the existing clauses of the bill, as to the date of the closure, and so forth, could be discussed and possibly amended in committee.
