QUIET DAY IN HOUSE AFTER LONG SESSION

Legislature Advances 18 Important Bills on Variety of Subjects

DISCUSSES U. S. MOVIES

The Legislature spent a quiet afternoon Thursday after the long struggle of the preceding night, receiving one or two important Government bills, advancing eighteen bills in committee stage, and debating the proposal of A. R. Nesbitt (Conservative, Northwest Toronto) to regulate the showing of American-made pictures in Ontario.

Bill to Amend Act.

In accordance with part of his debt retirement plan as announced in his Budget Address, Hon. W. H. Price introduced a bill to amend the Power Commission Act whereby the Hydro Commission will pay its obligations to the Province in cash instead of in bonds. The Hydro has already paid over some \$4,800,000 in bonds.

Hon. G. S. Henry, Minister of Public Works, introduced a bill enabling cities of more than 30,000 population to spend up to 10 cents per head of population on publicity. Formerly they were limited to \$2,000.

Premier Ferguson introduced a resolution sanctioning a \$5,000,000 loan for Northern development, and Provincial Treasurer Price followed with legislation to enable the borrowing of \$40,000,000.

Would Restrict Moneys.

Mr. Nesbitt found real sympathy in the House for his proposal to restrict American movies on a progressive system, but finally withdrew it out of deference to suggestions from the Treasury benches. Mr. Nesbitt pointed out that Australia had adopted some such system and he thought Ontario might well follow suit.
