CITY'S DISCOURTESY RAISES A PROTEST

Conservative Member Objects to Treatment of Premier King

W. G. Weichel, Conservative member for North Waterloo, speaking in the Legislature last night, protested against the discourtesy shown by the Council of the City of Toronto to Premier King and members of his Cabinet on their recent visit to Toronto.

"In Waterloo," he said, "we have always been proud of our native sons who have made good in the industrial, commercial, professional or political life of Canada. Sometimes we have not seen eye to eye politically, but we are always big enough to recognize merit and advancement even in those with whom we dis-

agreed. "Right Hon. W. L. M. King was born in my riding. I have differed with him politically, and do so today, but as Prime Minister of Canada he surely is deserving of the honors that are due that exalted position. I want to say now that as a member of the House, as a citizen of Canada, and as a representative of the riding of his birth, I cannot but protest most emphatically against the lack of courtesy shown by the City Council of Toronto on the occasion of his visit here.

"If they do not like the man himself, they at least could have shown him the honor and respect due the high office he holds. This applies as well to the Cabinet Ministers who accompanied him."
