LACK OF AMENDMENT CLOSES OFF DEBATE

Mr. Sinclair Explains Why He Did Not Reply to Col. Price

The termination yesterday in the Legislature of the debate on the amendment to the Address in Reply, which left Liberal members without any more say in the matter, brought from William E. N. Sinclair, Opposition Leader, the statement last night that "in his 14 years in the Legislature he has never seen the vote taken on amendment to the motion unless an amendment to the amendment was first voted upon."

"As I know it, the practice has always been to move an amendment to the amendment," he declared. "The members yesterday were just shut off from speaking further on the subject."

Mr. Sinclair declared further that he was consequently denied the opportunity of replying to the intimation made earlier by Attorney-General Price that the Opposition Leader had based his Waterloo address on information which he had obtained from the Federal Department of Justice.

EPIDEMIC THREATENED BY WORMS IN SHEEP

Hon. J. S. Martin Tells Legislature Committee of Seriousness of Disease

Before the Agriculture Committee of the Legislature yesterday Hon. John S. Martin, Minister of Agriculture, revealed that Dr. G. Stevenson of the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph had discovered that a certain condition in pigs and sheep which has made them unfit for marketing was attributable to worms.

This discovery, said Mr. Martin, was "an entirely new one," and most im-

portant from the standpoint of the farmer. Tests are now being made to determine a cure and treatment for the trouble. "It is," said Mr. Martin, "fairly general across the Province, and

if not checked might go right on through the farmyard and affect the other animals—poultry, too."
