HYDRO OFFER TO BUY SESSION PROROGUES FOR \$21,250,000 AFTER COMMITTEE OFFICIALLY RECORDED TABLES ITS REPORT

Announcement was made late yesterday by Chairman Charles A. Magrath that the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission had entered into an agreement with the Dominion Power and Transmission Company of Hamilton to buy the latter's assets at a price of Only approval of the \$21,250,000. shareholders of the Hamilton company to the purchase is required, and this, it is expected, will be forthcoming in a few days.

Mr. Magrath's announcement came at the close of a lengthy conference between the Commission and officials of the Dominion Power and Transmission Company. Legislation enabling the Commission to make the purchase was introduced to the Legislature by Premier Ferguson last week and given Royal assent at prorogation of the House yesterday afternoon.

"The Hydro-Electric Power Commission has entered into an agreement with Dominion Power and Transmission Company, Limited, for the purchase of its properties, including the shares of its subsidiaries, as follows:

"The Hamilton Cataract Power, Light and Traction Company.

"The Hamilton Electric Light and

Power Company, Limited. "The Hamilton Street Railway Com-

pany.

"The Hamilton and Dundas Street Railway Company "The Hamilton Radial Electric Rail-

way Company.

"The Hamilton, Grimsby and Beamsville Electric Railway Company.

The Brantford and Hamilton Electric Railway Company.

"Hamilton Terminal Company, Limited.

"The Dundas Electric Company, Limited.

"The Lincoln Electric Light and Power Company, Limited.

"The Western Counties Electric Company, Limited.

"The Highway King Busses Limited. "This agreement must be approved by the shareholders of Dominion Power and Transmission Company, and it is understood that they will be called together at an early date for that purpose.

"The purchase price is \$21,250,000. payable in debentures of the Committy sion, guaranteed by the Province of tario."

His Honor Lieutenant-Governor William D.
