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## MARINE NEWS

Last issue, we mentioned that Groupe Desgagnes Inc. had purchased in Sweden a tanker for operation by its Petro-Nav affiliate. We now learn that the vessel involved is the EK-SKY, purchased by Desgagnes from Ektank A.B., of Sweden. Built in 1975, the ship is double-hulled, and of 9712 dwt. An interesting new name has been chosen for the tanker; she will be rechristened PETROLIA DESGAGNES. In the past, Desgagnes ships have been named for members of the Desgagnes family, but this contrived name is a departure from that tradition.

Meanwhile, Algoma Central Tankers has begun to repaint the former Imperial Oil tankers which it acquired in January, and to operate them under their new names. (See our January issue for the renames.) Of particular note is the fact that after being laid up since 1996, IMPERIAL ACADIA was drydocked, repainted, and went back into service on February 11th as (b) ALGOSCOTIA. We now understand that Algoma Central also has acquired A. G. FARQUHARSON (currently laid up at Halifax and under a year's charter to Petro-Nav since last
