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FIND HEALTH AND RECREATION CRUISING AMONG THE LAKE ERIE ISLANDS

Cedar Point and Put-In-Bay Island are Thronged with Pleasure Seekers

We are again planning to give service between Detroit, Put-In-Bay, Cedar Point and Sandusky.

This service will be inaugurated Sunday, June 23rd, leaving Detroit on Wednesdays, Thursdays, Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays. There will be cut-rate excursions to Cedar Point on Wednesdays and Fridays but will run on Sundays, as well, at the regular rates, allowing three hours ashore. Cedar Point has the largest sandy bathing beach of any resort that I know of. Has a board walk along the lake front leading to the Amusement Center, where all kinds of gay rides are to be had. Another feature of Cedar Point is the tractor train which conveys you from the Boat Pier to the Amusement Park. For people stopping for week ends and vacations, there is the Hotel Breakers of over one thousand rooms. There are also mammoth restaurants and a dance pavilion, where one can sure spend a lively time. I advise families to go to Cedar Point on a Wednesday or Friday when everything will be done to amuse the mothers and children aboard the boat, on this extended trip, a one hundred and sixty mile cruise, due back at Detroit at 11 P. M. It is well worth while. On Thursdays and Saturdays the boat stops at Cedar Point, but passengers will not have time to visit ashore and return that evening, as the Steamer Put-In-Bay arrives back at Detroit at 8 P. M. in time to give a Moonlight Trip up to Lake St. Clair. The boat is chartered for the season to various societies for these Moonlights.

As to Put-In-Bay, passengers will have over three hours there on Thursdays and Saturdays, and on Wednesdays, Fridays and Sundays will have over six hours. There is a beautiful park at Put-In-Bay with plenty of picnic benches and play equipment, and if you are having a picnic lunch you will find hot tea and coffee and soft drinks at the many hotels and restaurants facing the Park, or you may buy complete hot meals at these hotels if you so desire. A nice feature of the picnic grove is the close proximity to the boat landing. Other attractions at Put-In-Bay are bicycles and ponies which may be rented. There are also big touring cars available to tour the island on its concrete state roads, and take parties out to the caves and wineries. Do not fail to visit Perry's Victory Memorial Monument. There are airplanes out at the airport, and many people enjoy a flight over the water and islands of Lake Erie. There is also a nice bathing beach. In fact you can spend an enjoyable afternoon at Put-In-Bay.

On Tuesdays, the Steamer Put-In-Bay is scheduled out of Toledo, some trips to Put-In-Bay and Cedar Point and other trips from Toledo to Tashmoo Park. On account of the extended time we are giving ashore, at these resorts, there will be no Moonlights out of Toledo, this season.

As to the boat, the Steamship Put-In-Bay has the largest dance floor of any of the Great Lakes excursion boats—no extra charge for dancing. There are private parlors and deck chairs on the sheltered top deck. This ship does not carry freight but is limited to passengers only. If you do not care to stop at any of the resorts, you can buy a continuous ride trip for \$3.00 for the day

SATURDAY MOONLIGHTS

Every Saturday night during this season the Steamer Put-In-Bay will sail from the First Street Dock on a Moonlight Cruise of the Detroit River and Lake St. Clair. This will afford sweltering Detroiters an opportunity to escape from the heat of the city for a few hours sail in the cool, water washed breezes of Lake St. Clair. During the moonlight cruise the passengers have an opportunity to view all the principal points of interest along the American and Canadian shorelines. Ambassador Bridge, Detroit's Skyline, Belle Isle Bridge and the Island itself, Waterworks Park, and the beautiful lakeshore drive through the Grosse Pointes. On the Canadian side the ship passes Ford of Canada, and many beautiful summer estates while on the Detroit River the vessel is constantly passing other passenger and freight boats as well as myriads of small craft, speedboats, cruisers, sailing ships and palatial yachts.

Aboard the ship there is continuous dancing in the ballroom on the largest dance floor on any Great Lakes vessel, with Finzel's famous orchestra dispensing the melodies. There are tables for cards in the beautiful Blue Cabin and refreshment stands where you can get food and beverages to suit your taste. Many prefer to just sit quietly in the moonlight on the outer decks. You'll surely come home feeling much refreshed after a few hours in the cooling breeze on the decks of the big Steamer Put-In-Bay. Try this cruise next Saturday night. The Steamer Put-In-Bay sails from the dock at the foot of First Street every Saturday night at 8:45 P.M. and returns to the wharf at 11:45 P.M.



The big steel steamer Put-In-Bay is 256 feet long, 60 foot beam and a draft of 13 feet, 6 inches. She carries 2800 passengers and her 3000 horsepower engines give the ship a speed of 20 miles per hour.
