

Study

Halton Region has initiated a Municipal Class Environmental Assessment (MCEA) Study for Regional Road 25 from Steeles Avenue (Regional Road 8) to 5 Side Road, in the Town of Milton and Town of Halton Hills. The MCEA Study will consider a wide range of road improvement alternatives as well as intersection improvements, active transportation and overall traffic operations. The impact of road improvements on social, cultural, economic and natural environments will also be evaluated and assessed during the study.

Process

The study is being conducted in compliance with Schedule C of the Municipal Class Environmental Assessment (October 2000, amended 2007, 2011 and 2015), which is approved under the Ontario Environmental Assessment Act.

A key component of the study will be consultation with interested stakeholders (public and regulatory agencies) through Public Information Centres (PIC). The first Public Information Centre has been arranged for:

ly," she said.

"It's not the norm, but I have experienced occasions where constituents will try to diminish my intelligence, or will make very insulting statements online, via email and when they call my office. Sometimes they are aggressive.. Bullies act when they feel threatened, so I try not to let their comments and actions get to me."

The Post reached out to Halton's mayors to see if they felt their female councillors were bullied and harassed more than their male colleagues — Rob Burton (Oakville) and Gord Krantz (Milton) said neither of them have seen their councillors bullied, while Rick Goldring (Burlington) said he was "unable to quantify the actual occurrences or speak to the personal feelings or reactions by individual councillors."

Halton MPP Indira Naidoo-Harris said she doesn't feel she's been attacked personally, but admitted she's encountered tweets and social media posts that are critical and an attack from a position of party politics.

"Those are the things I don't even look at. I'm not interested in them. So, there are things out there that can be conceived as being negative," she said.

"Idon't see them as being personally directed at me but at the same time, I tend not to pay too much attention to things like that because I'm more focused on my work and on that kind of unfair, bullying and harassment."

Naidoo-Harris did note, however, that bullying directed at women in politics is something we need to examine as a society and work collectively against.

Milton MP Lisa Raitt did not respond to requests for comments.
