Milton Transit ridership, revenue up in Q1 2018

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
Ridership and revenue were up on Milton town buses for the first three months of this year, but one councillor doesn't see it as good news.

Councillors received a Milton Transit report for the first quarter of 2018 at their most recent council meeting. There was a five per cent increase in ridership compared to the first quarter of 2017; revenue passenger trips grew by six per cent during the same period.

Ridership in the first quarter of 2018 grew by more than 7,100 boardings compared to the same period last year, with more than 140,200 boardings in the first quarter, stated a Town of Milton press release.

"Transit growth continues to be influenced by local economic and residential growth, service enhancements and service reliability improvements made in 2017," said the town.

Ridership for Milton Transit's specialized transit program, Milton access+, increased by seven per cent compared to the

first quarter of the previous year, as a result of trip growth and expanded eligibility requirements.

"This significant ridership growth is expected to continue and be complemented by additional service enhancements planned for September of this year," stated the town's

press release. The seemingly positive statistics didn't impress Ward 4 Coun. Rick Malboeuf, a regular transit critic.

"Why can't we get quarterly ridership numbers faster? We are almost at the end of the second quarter (April-June) and we're now

getting the first quarter numbers. Why do we have to wait 10 weeks?"

Paul Cripps, the town's commissioner of engineering services, told council, "We understand the councillor's frustration and we are working on this."

Malboeuf then noted that relatively recently introduced extended evening hours and weekend bus service is costing taxpayers \$500,000 per year.

"It (extra services) didn't exist seven months ago and people did without it," he noted, saying it's not a good use of taxpayer dol-
