MARLINS FAREWELL MARKED WITH JUNIOR NATIONAL MEDALS

'I WANTED TO DO THEM PROUD, SAYS UNIVERSITY OF TORONTO-BOUND GRAEME AYLWARD

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
Graeme Aylward headed to Winnipeg with a little more motivation than usu-

After six years and more than 500 races, the 18-yearold Miltonian — bound for the University of Toronto Varsity Blues next month — was about to represent his hometown Marlins for the very last time.

To say his sense of purpose was at an all-time high would be putting it mildly.

"I definitely wanted to finish strong ... for this meet to represent all the hard work I've put in;" said the breaststroke specialist. "With everything the club's put into me — all the

time and resources — I wanted to do them proud." Aylward did just that.

Giving the Marlins their first junior national championship medals in seven years, he highlighted the week with a silver in the 200-metre breaststroke shedding a full two seconds off his personal-best time, with a 2:21.88 performance.

"I had a crazy energy on the block. The adrenalin

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was insane," said Aylward, who'll be studying mechanical engineering at U of T and has received plenty of financial assistance in recent months — including a \$16,000 Swim Ontario Post-Secondary Scholarship and the Chris Hadfield Bursary for \$3,000.

"The plan (for 200-m race) was to go out fast, shock everyone and just try to hold on. I was really satisfied and happy with my time."

Buoyed by a solid showing one week earlier at the national trials in Edmonton — which was about gaining experience more than anything — the Marlins standout also reached the podium in his staple breaststroke. A 1:05.22 effort — more than a half-hour better than the first time he swam it in competition at age 13 was good enough for bronze, beating out Saskatchewan's Ruishen Yu by a razor-thin .08 seconds.

Aylward also set a new

personal best in the 100-m freestyle in Winnipeg, clocking in at 53.50 seconds.

Part of Swim Canada's On Track list, the Bishop Reding high school graduate began a sort of local swansong campaign earlier this year with a threemedal performance at OF-SAA — which was highlighted by a record-break-

ing gold medal effort (57.64) seconds) in the 100-m individual medley.

Now Aylward takes his 3 talents to the collegiate level, doing so with equal ? parts excitement and confidence.

"Jamie (Brough) and the other coaches have 5 done a great job to get me o ready. I feel prepared," Ayl- 8 ward said.

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
