When the curd is salted it is put into the hoops and pressed three or four hours then turned and bandaged, and again pressed for 24 hours. It is then taken from the hoop, dressed and transferred to the drying room, where it is turned daily, and kept oiled to prevent the surfrom becoming too dry. A visit of an hour's duration at the factory would render these hints more clear. There are two or three factories in successful operation in Canada West, the first which was opened by Mr Wade, near Port Hope; there are two others near Ingersoll.
