HOP CIRCULAR

New York, Friday, noon, June 24, 1870.

The firmness which has characterized our market during the past few weeks has been increased by further discouraging reports from the growing districts. The ravages of the grub and cut-worm continue unabated; and not only are these pests reported as increasing in numbers, but their appearance is becoming alarmingly general throughout the entire hop-growing districts of the country. It is generally known that the aphis or hop-louse may come upon the vines in myr iads and remain for several days, and then suddenly disappear without doing any mate rial damage; but the appearance of the grub and cut-worm is the more dreaded, as their ravages are unmistakably shown by the vine turning yellow. All reports of fly and lice a this early day are of but little account when compared to the threatened destruction of the entire crop by the worms.
