Speculators have for the present withdrawn, and business is again confined to the legitimate wants of customers, 35-tf who have been buying very sparingly. The volume of business doubtless might be largely increased, could such Hops as are wanted be found. but fine Hops do not exist. Brewers are not disposed to stock up with rubbish, nor do they feel like laying in a large supply of good old Hops now, knowing that the latter are plenty and cheap and can be had at any time. When prices open low in the beginning of the season, most brewers are in the habit of laying in supplies sufficient to carry them through the whole season; but with high prices, such as now rule, they buy on the hand-to-mouth principle.
