Many of the latter class would come out of bar-rooms after indulging in those intoxicating drinks, I meet Temperance men on the street, and tell them now is the time to shew your consistency by voting for a good Temperance man who will bring us prohibition. But if any lody believed there was a spark of sincerity about one of those persons of either class, they were very much deceived. It they were really honest in this matter. why want for Mr. C.'s influence in parliament to blot out the evil they are doing. Why, not let conscience and moral principle do their daty. and give up their demoralizing traffic voluntarily, and not be coerced or driven to it by legal enactments. But! the sequel is, Mr. C. has promised to see their rights protected; or in other
