



If you are advised that your invention is patent able, send \$20 to pay Government application fee of ! \$15, and \$5 for the drawings required by the Government. This is payable when application is made and is all of the expense unless a patent, is allowed. When allowed, the attorney's fee (825) and the final Government fee (\$20) is payable. Thus you know beforehand, "for nothing," whether youare going t get a patent or not, and no attorney's fee is charged unless you do get a Patent. An attorney whose fee depends on his success in obtaining a Patent will not advise you that your invention is patentable unless it really is patentable, so far as his best adgment can aid in determing the question; hence you can rely on the advice given after a preliminary examination is had.
