**LOCAL NEWS.**

**DR. W. F. FREEMAN**, of Walkerton, was here yesterday. He came to attend the funeral of his uncle, the late Mr. C. G. Cobban.

**MR. MARZATT**, of Stewarton, was badly hurt on Monday by a wagon load of logs upsetting and falling on him. He is getting better.

**APPRAISER**—The Township Clerk of Nelson has appraised against the entire voters' list of his township on the ground that the letters "M. F." were omitted from the lists when printed.

**DR. JONES**—That a certain member of a large lumber firm operating northwards, and a resident of Halton, will be a candidate at the nomination for the next local election, in opposition to the present member.

**REFRESHMENT CENTER**—The young ladies of the Milton Methodist Church will have a refreshment center on the fair grounds on the second day of the county show; a hot dinner can also be had for 25 cents.

**THE OAKVILLE STARS** ended their season's career on Saturday by beating Nelson's by 5 to 3. Batteries—Cole and Fitzgerald, Maguire and Perkins. They also defeated Georgetown on Friday by 22 to 8, making a total of 27 games won and 7 lost.

**A GREAT CONCERT**—The concert on the evening of the second day of the county show, for the purpose of the parsonage fund of Grace Church, promises to be a first-class one. Some of the most prominent musicians in the Province have been written to and asked for their terms, and will likely be engaged.

**GRACE CHURCH**—The social at the Agricultural Society's grounds yesterday was very successful. The short time during which it had been advertised, was a great success, the receipts amounting to \$11. The hall was tastefully decorated, and the grounds illuminated with colored lanterns. The Milton band played a number of selections in good style.

**ARRESTED**—Constable Crowe had a warrant placed in his hands last week for the arrest of one of the Forbes family at Campbellville, for an alleged criminal act and cutting a Miss DeForest away from her home. Forbes managed to escape arrest until Tuesday when he was taken to Guelph, but was set at liberty as no Halton constable went up after him.

**OWENS** to the continued illness of Mrs. A. H. Drumm, the Rev. William Brown has asked his congregation to contribute to the relief fund.

**THE GEORGETOWN HALL**, the intention of the Rev. gentleman and Mrs. Drumm to spend some time in Colorado in the hope that the change will be beneficial. This necessity is especially regretted because the numerous friends here of the Rev. gentleman and his estimable wife and it is earnestly hoped that the change may result in the restoration of her health.

**TORONTO'S SEEDY POINT**—The Toronto World of this morning contains a report of a visit to the Ontario Terra Cotta Brick and Sewer Works at Campbellville. The World says that the Campbellville bricks are superior to those which have heretofore been imported to Toronto at half the price. The report concludes as follows:—"All the country under the mountain west of Milton is covered with quarries, lime kilns, and now brick works are coming. The main supply of Toronto's building trade will soon be drawn from this locality."

**FALL FAIR**—The Fall Fair will be held on the Oct. 10th and 11th, when the usual prizes will be awarded. A number of new attractions have been added. On the first day there will be an open trot for \$99, a green trot for \$15, and an open running race for \$35. The Cayuga Indian Band will be present in the evening and the grounds and hall will be open to the public. On the second day the Am. & C. will play and give a concert in the evening. There will also be two speeding contests for farmers' brood mares. A large number of special prizes will be given in addition to the usual prize list, so that our fair will be on a par with other neighboring fairs and a larger crowd may be expected than heretofore.

**FIRE**—On Thursday last about noon Mr. J. W. Cottrell, of Esquimaux, had the misfortune to lose his stone dwelling by fire. The fire originated in some manner from the chimney and ignited the roof of the kitchen, and as the wind was blowing very strong at the time, and the roof was very dry, it was impossible to stop it. Mr. Cottrell was on the roof of the main building and had a very narrow escape from being scorched, as he slipped and slid stepped with his feet hanging over the ledge and the fire burning beneath him. Mr. Cottrell saved his furniture from the main building, but all was burned in the kitchen, together with some \$250. He was insured in the Grand Mutual for only \$500. At the time of this fire Mrs. Campbell's dwelling on the next farm had a narrow escape. A spark from the chimney had ignited the roof and was noticed by Mr. Owen Robertson, who was passing at the time, who suppressed it. Mrs. Campbell and all her people were at Mr. Cottrell's fire.

**IRA FAINE**, the American rifleman who was shot, died in Paris yesterday from strangulation of the bowels, after 42 hours suffering.

**THE MINISTER OF FINANCE** intends to tax the Protestant Church in the British Province. Those Churches have hitherto been exempt from taxation. This is one of a series of reforms by which the Government intends to thoroughly Russinize the old Baltic German institutions and to diminish the influence of the German Protestant clergy.
