Gen. J. B. Weaver writes upon the 'Threefold Contentions of Industry,' contending that monopoly in land, money, and transportation operated to make the poor man grow poorer, while a specially favored class necessarily grows richer.

Henry Wood writes in a scholarly manner on 'Revelation through Nature,' 'Laminated' and 'Discoloration' in the 'Farmers' Alliance Wedge in Congress.'

This article is illustrating with nine photographs. It is an interesting and chatty paper, conveying an excellent impression of this kind of matter.

Hon. Walter Clark, LL.D., Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of North Carolina, contributes one of the most powerful arguments in favor of governmental control of the telegraph and telephone.

Wm. Q. Judge, who is at the head of the Theosophical movement in America, defends Madame Blavatsky, and Charles Schroder institutes a comparison between the Duke of Marlborough and the Duke of Devonshire.

Mrs. Schuyler Van Rensselaer has an article on 'St. Paul's Cathedral,' which is brilliantly illustrated by Joseph Pennell.

The United States Fish Commission is described by Mr. Richard Rathbun, a scientific member of the staff.

Professor Henry C. Adams presents a timely study of 'The Farmer and Railway Legislation.' Professor Boyesen tells of 'An Acquaintance with Hans Christian Andersen.'

Colonel Richard Malcolm Johnson, the popular poet, has a paper, illustrated by Romble, on 'Middle Georgia Rural Life.' In this number the Kipling Balaister 'Nanahka' is continued, as well as Dr. Weir Mitchell's 'Characteristics.'

Hammond, author of 'Main Traveler Road,' etc., begins a serial in three parts entitled 'Of Pap's Flaxen.' Dorothy Prescott, a new writer, makes a social study of the environs of Boston in an illustrated story called 'The Told-tale.' Miss Viola Rosboro' tells the story of 'The Village Romance,' and Mrs. Burton Harrison (author of 'The Apollonians') that of 'Gay's Romance.'

Pictorially the number is enriched not only for the descriptive articles, so called, but for some of Mr. Cole's engraving, this time after Giorgione. The well-known picture, by Sargent, of Miss Beatrice Goetz is given in the series of American paintings.

Among the poets of the number are Thomas Bailey Aldrich, Mrs. James T. Field, Langdon E. Mitchell, Charlotte Fiske Bates, Alice Williams Brotherton, Mr. Buel's article on the Louisiana Lottery in the celebratory number is followed in this number by an editorial on 'The Louisiana Lottery' written before the withdrawal of the Lottery from the Louisiana State.

Other editorials are on 'Columbia College,' 'National Justice to Postal Clerks,' and 'A Columbia Fair Memorial Building.' In 'Open Letters' are discussed 'The Commercial Strength of the Confederate Army,' 'The Illinois of Lincoln's Time,' and Mrs. Van Rensselaer has a brief essay on the painter Sargent.
