extent in the following manner: Throw the shoulders well back and hold the head well up. Inflate the lungs slowly, the air entering entirely through the nose. When the lungs are completely filled, hold the breath for ten seconds or longer, and then expire it quickly through the mouth.

After repeating this exercise while one is chilly a feeling of warmth will be felt over the entire body and even in the feet and hands. It is important to practice this exercise many times each day, and especially when in the open air. If the habit ever becomes universal, then consumpti and many other diseases will rarely, ever, be heard of. Not only while practic ing the breathing exercise must the cloth ing be loose over the chest, but beginner will do well to remember, in having their clothing fitted, to allow for the permanent expansion of one inch, two inches or ever three inches, which will eventually fol low. - New York Ledger.
