At night from 6 to 8 p. m the only real meal of the day is prepared It is almost always the same. This consists of a little very greasy soup, to which is added semna, stewed or boiled mutton or goat's flesh on a pyramid of rice, and the ceremorial dish of riz b'il laban (boiled rice and milk). This last is always good, and in most cases is the only thing catable. Pigeons and turkeys form a pleasant variety when offered, but few hosts give one the choice, a "lamb or kid of the flock" being considered a more "honorable" dish and demanded by one's position
