A charge of shot in the large bore of the shotgun offers much less resistance than a solid and tightly fitting bullet, and it is not so much the amount of powder in a gun as the amount of resistance to its ex pansion, that endangers its bursting. Smokeless powder is practically gun cotton tamed down, its explosive prin ciple being-nitro-glycerine or a similar nitro product.
