The fastest run from start to stop is on the Caledonian. A train starts every evenng from Forfar for Perth, a distance o 321 miles, and is due to arrive in 33 minutes. The next best run, irrespective of distance, is upon the Glasgow and South-Western. Here a train runs from Ardrossan to Paisley at 56.4 miles an nour, or 241 miles in 26 minutes. 
