

present is not whether the restrictions were justifiable when they were imposed, but whether there is any good reason for continuing them. As Lord Provost Chisholm defined the question, it is "Is there any evidence to warrant the maintenanc of these most offensive restrictions? There appears to be none, but there is abundant evidence to the contrary. For instance, the Dominion Minister of Agriculture positively affirms that contagious pleuro does not exist in Canada; and that even if it did exist, it could not be exported, so thorough are the regulations and precautions in force Canada.
