In a state of nature this grows to be tree from twenty to thirty feet in height, with rather large, oval, entire marghed leaves and yellowish flowers succeeded by small, brown drupes re. sembling acorns in shape. The grayish brown bark is internally of an orange color, which changes upon drying to the characteristic brown which is the recognized name of a particular shade.
