He must have must be able to tear down, build up. gild, paint, place electric wires and do many another task that would be difficult enough on the solid earth There are many ways of getting up on a steeple, and when all others fail the man will tie a rope around it and then, with a coll on his back, walk round and round it until the entire steeple is covered with tope, and in such case he has probably been round

There a man has to work with might and main to lift himself inch by luch from top is 300 feet high. The steeple jack's safety depends upon the hook, and until he has raised himself almost to the top it is impossible for him to see whether ar not the hook has been properly adjusted. More than once a steeple climber has seen when within ten feet of the top that corrosion of the iron and the collection of soot have so thickened the wall that the book is merely balancing on the top, so that the slightest pull in the wrong direction would drag it off. Again, the bricks are often loose at the top, and the book is likely to

tear them away, One of the natural difficulties to conquer is the swaying of all high steeples and chimneys. In a gale a steeple point will sway a foot and a bait. Usually it sways from seven to nine inches. Painting it means reaching for a spot on the right side, and finding it on the left, and, when making a dive for it on the left, to see it sway back to the right. Yet in spite of the constant danger a born steeple jack exinches to bear his weight.-Harver's
