

Says Experienced Farmer

Writing of sweet clover as a mulch, Wm. Linton, of Aurora, Ont., says: My experience with sweet clover as an orchard mulch and a renovator of worn-out lands has led me to believe that there is a large field for sweet clover to fill, as every tiller of the soil appreciates the advent a restorative, for the soil is fast becoming depleted of its nitrogen and humus in the older parts of Ontario and requires rebuilding. We plowed down an acre when it was three feet high, and another two acres we mowed when it was the same height, leaving the crop on the ground, and allowing It to grow for the second cutting. The results so far have been satisfactory and we expect these results to continue. The growth of the young trees was exceptional; every branch grew from three to four feet. After cut ting we were surprised to find how soon it rotted, both root and branch, and became a complete mulch. covered the ground completely and gave a large percentage of nitrogen and with its deep roots brought up

the deep-lying potash. From our e perience with it we think it a great boon to the orchardist, as well as to the agriculturist generally. Sweet Clover was first introduced into the United States in the early part of the 18th century by the colonists from Europe.
