DISMISSED WITH COSTS.

Friday, at Osgoode Hall, Mr. Justice Kelly delivered judgment in the Trafalgar quarantine case, tried by him at the Halton Spring Assizes. The following is the report published in the Patterson vs. Local Board of Health

of Township of Trafalgar et al—A. R. Hassard for plaintiff. I. B. Lucas, K. C., and W. I. Dick, for defendants. Action by married woman and her children against the Board of Health for Trafalgar and Dr. H. A. McColl to recover \$5,000 damages, for quarantir ing them from 1st November until 19th December, 1917, during illness of son, Clarence, with scarlet fever, Judgment: There is not a shadow of foundation to support the claim against the defendant McColl, and against him the case must be dismissed. . . Patterson had become familiar with the health regulations, the necessity for the quarantine, length of time during which the Public Health Act required have done and knew that he could have done, communicate with these The action is so lack-

ing in real merit that it seems unfortunate that it should have been prosecuted with such determination. Even if there had been justification for it the damages could not have been other than merely nominal. Such litigation should not be encouraged, especially at the behest of a man who might, if he chose, have avoided or removed all possible occasion for com plaint. The only result is to dismiss the action as against both defendants

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
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
