## New Aquatic Sport.

Floating around in the water, with one's head and shoulders projecting blossom, is a new aquatic sport made possible by an ingenious invention. which is described in Popular Mechanics Magazine. The novel float, designed for use at bathing beaches, has an upper part of ornamentally shaped metal, with an annular ai chamber at its bulging water line. From this superstructure hangs a pair of trousers made of waterproof fabric, on the outside of which are series of vanes that act as paddles when the occupants propels himself along by a walking motion. The buoyancy of the air chamber is great enough to support a number of gwimmers.

Few Roads.

The ancient British colony of Newfoundland is said to be almost entirely devoid of roads as most of the inhabitants live along the shores and few of them have penetrated into the interior. Some English capitalists have already bought up a great deal of the land in the interior, which offers possibilities for the establishment of paper and pulp plants and the first step required is the building of a system of roadways over a part of the island. 

In drilling to test the commercial possibilities of the salt beds in the Fort McMurray district of the Peace River country, recently, it was found that there are nearly 109 feet of anhydrite and gypsum of commercial quality at depths ranging from 500

to 600 feet, and if a market can be found for it there is a large reserve available for development. Gypsum is one of the important non-metallic minerals of Canada, and is found in several of the provinces, but was not known to exist in the far north. New uses are being constantly found for this adaptable material, and the revival of the building industry, in which it is used for wall plaster and plaster of paris, will doubtless result in an increased production. As a fertilizer it has the property of releasing plant food in

Chemically stated gypsum is hydrated sulphate of calcium. During the war Germany made thousands of tons of sulphuric acid from sypsum, and it is stated that the acid made in this manner is as pure as that obtained from sulphur and purer than that obtained from pyrites. The total production of this minferal in Canada in 1920 was valued at 41,876,595, but the value of the deposits of the ore must run into many
