Making Marsh Gas Works. On a Surrey, England, farm a real-

ing of the will o' the wisp which is one form of marsh gas. It was discovered during the war that marsh gas could be produced in quantities sufficient to be of practical use, whether for heat or power. Almost all manure, whether from the farmyard or from leaves or other rotting wegetation, gives off at a certain stage large volumes of marsh gas. A building has now been designed into which the manure is pitched at the right time, and the gas forming above it is taken off and measured. A double purpose may be thus served. The manure is protected from the weather and does not lose its valuable qualities, and the gas from

t may be employed to run the machinery of the farm. The gas is at present a little fickle. Sometimes the quantities are great, sometimes small; but the cause of the variation is being probed and great results are expected. Already in moderately favorable conditions Quite enough gas is secured to provide what power is needed. There is indeed no inherent reason why every farmer should not make his own gas without the use of coal. Almost no apparatus beyond an air-tight reservoir and a pipe is needed.

Making Over Paper. Though chemical processes for the reclamation of printed book paper have been in use for some time, their efficiency is reduced by the fact that the mechanical pulping forces the ink permanently into the fibers, says Popular Mechanics Magazine. By a mixture of 10 pounds of borax, ten pounds of none pounds of soap, two gallons of kerosene and two gallons of pine oil is used for soaking 2,000 pounds of stock, with enough water to make 3 to 6 per cent. pulp. The beater used pulls the stock apart gently, with a minimum breakage of the fibers, and the process is continued for an hour or less, with the pulp heated to from 165 to 190 degrees F. by live steam. The separated ink and the chemicals are then washed away by the usual method, and the
