





ground at Sidmouth, Devon, England. recently, remains were found of what is believed to be a prehistoric village. Over 300 articles were dug up, m cluding arrow points, stone axes, knives, flints, and pleces of British pottery, probably over 2,000 years old, specimens of which have been forwarded to the British Museum. The find was made by Mr. D. Chambers, who claims it is the ninth prehistoric British village he has unearthed. Some excavations at Shoreham-by-Sea, near Brighton, have revealed a well-preserved specimen of a Wear that it is possible to fit voll in flint-made hand axe, which is supposed to be a relic of the Paleolithic Style Shoe Voll desire-

which existed before the Roman conquest have also been found recently near Devizes, Wiltshire. The village proved to be the home of a community who lived in the Early Iron Age, and was occupied for about 300 years. Pottery was found, but nothing of the Roman type, and from the fact that all the relics were much before that period the village must be more than 2,000 years old.

A skin disease on the top of the head of Francis I. of France, which induced alopecia, or bald patches, tiers all followed suit.
