SOLVED EGYPTIAN RIDDLE.

Remarkable Feat Accomplished Young French Genius.

Had it not been for the labors of a young French genius of a hundred years ago it might be impossible for modern scholars to understand the More Room for your con value of the discoveries now being made in the tomb of King Tut-ankhamen. It was Jean Francis Champoliton who really unlocked the door to ancient Egypt, and discovered how the hieroglyphics were to be read. His discoveries, again, were due to

the accidental discovery of another Frenchman. This was the finding of the Rosetta Stone, now one of the Museum. This stone, a basalt steel tablet, was dug up by one of Napoleon's officers when he was excavating for a redoubt near Fort St. We operate the Only Lens Julien, four miles south of the town of Rosetta, on the western bank of 1799. The tablet was not intact, but scholars had little difficulty in determining that it contained a text in the three different languages, represented by as many different forms of character. One of them was Greek, and it was thus that scientists were able to guess what the other languages meant. The stone was about to be shipped to France, but Nelson's victory at Alexandria led to it falling into the hands of the


