Readhead, farmer, Nelson, Dr. H. A. McColl, Milton, E. A. Harris, publisher of the Burlington Gazette aud John Kelly, Oakville. The five last named retired in favor of Mr. Dale, whose nomination was

unanimous and enthusiastic. At the public meeting W. J. Clements was chairman. The candidate made a short speech

The principal speaker was Robt. L. Bracken, M.P.P., for West Kent. He criticised the Drury government for its extravagance, its abuses in connection with patronage, which it had promised to abolish, its incompetence, manifested in the frequent appointments of commissions to investigate and report on matters which competent legislators would have taken care of, and acting on the advice of the commissions instead of on its own knowledge and judgment. He particularly condemned the Gregory commission. He gave Premier Drury credit for ability, particularly for his persuasiveness as a speaker, and for high ideals, but said he was too much of an idealist. Ontario needed practical government, by men of real business ability, of knowledge of finance with practical experience. The cases undertaken by the Fund in this province afford an illustration of its varied and useful operations and, at the same time, constitute an appeal for Provincial support, which will be needed, even if a further grant be made by the Government, as the applications likely to be received from all parts of the Province, when the Fund becomes better known, will far exceed its present resources.

During the last few days the Fund has had several such applications from outside Toronto. One of these is from Milton, Ont., for the interment of an ex-service man who has died without friends or funds, who, in a pencilled note, written on his deathbed to the local authorities. said, "Please bury me by the Last Post Fund."

Those already dealt with comprise an Imperial yeteran, who had served FREE AIR in the Indian Mutiny, a York Ranger who had served in the Fenian Raid a naval man; another, an Imperial veteran, whose body had been taken to the School of Anatomy for dissection, and a number of younger men, who had served in the C.E.F. in the Great War. Each case has had its own pathetic interest, and all were taken to their last resting place with every circumstance of respect and

Interment, however, is not the only

service which the fund is called upon to render. Distant relatives in some cases have to be found, in whose interests the effects of the deceased (medals, decorations, etc.), have to be safeguarded. Financial help, too, has to be sought for cases of poverty among dependents, and, occasionally, sympathetic advice and aid given where no monetary aid is required. It is hoped that branches of the Fund will be formed in other parts of the Province. One such has already been formed in London, Ont., and another is in process of formation in Kingston, Ont., so that places distant HOME at from the Toronto headquarters may
