WORLD WITHOUT PAIN.

Queen Victoria Gave It Recognition In England. The recent discovery of a new anaesthetic marks another step for-

Pain is the bugbear of the human race. By many it is dreaded more than death itself. Yet, although pain has always dogged man's footsteps, it was not until about one hundred

Up to that time relief was sought by methods that to the modern mind seem distressingly crude. Drugs and similar compositions made from the poppy, belladonna, solanum, mandrake, mandragora, and nepenthe, were administered by the mouth. One of the earliest records of this form of anaesthetic occurs in Chinese history, which shows that a physician in the third century put his patients to sleep by using a prepar-

ation of hemp. The ancient Britons stewed certain herbs and inhaled the fumes by way of inducing sleep. In 1800 Sir Humphry Davy, experimenting in his laboratory with nitrous oxide, discovered its sleep-producing properties, and suggested its use in surgical practice. The idea. however, remained unheeded for nearly half a century, the first person to put the substance to practical use being an American dental surgeon, Dr. Horace Wells, who had one of his own teeth extracted while under its influence, and for some years used it in dealing with his patients. Later, a Boston dentist used ether for the same purpose, and a new era

I I Uli in surgery was opened. At about this period there was born in Scotland James Simpson, who conferred on humanity one of its greatest booms-that of chloro-

> One day in 1847 a friend of Simpson's, a chemist residing in Liver pool, sent him a tube containing a thick colorless liquid which had lately become known to science under the name of chloroform. Curiously enough, two German research chemists had discovered the drug fifteen years previously, but neither of them knew to what great use it

That evening Simpson, with two

local doctors, discussed the stuff in the phial, and then took a deep breath of it. They went on talking about other matters for some minutes, until one by one they dropped into a deep, dreamless slumber. All the world knows the result of that experiment, although it should be added that Simpson was scorned until Queen Victoria, an occasion arising, boldly allowed herself to be chloroformed, and emerged from the ordeal to express her gratitude by making Simpson her physician.-Pearson's Weekly.
