new and interesting crops are: Field The water ordeal was performed in either hot or cold. In cold water the persons suspected were adjudged innocent if their bodies were borne up by the water. In hot water they were to put their bare arms or legs into scalding water, and if brought out again unhurt they were declared

Women accused of incontinency formerly underwent, the ordeal to prove their innocence.

A prisoner who pleaded not guilty might choose whether he put himself for trial upon God and his country by twelve men, as it is to-day, or upon God only. The latter was called the judgment of God.

In the ordeal by fire the accused had to pass barefooted and blind fold over nine red-hot ploughshares, or carry burning irons in their hands. In England such ordeals were used from Edward the Confessor's time to that of Henry III. In Scotland the trial by ordeal was

very much the same as it was in England, and of longer persistency. Chief amongst these was the trial by touch. A person accused of murder was required to touch the corpse. If he were guilty the corpse was supposed to give some significant sign, or leave some convicting mark on the accused's hand.

The ordeal trial prevailed in France from before the time of Charlemagne down to the eleventhcentury. The ancient Germans, too, resorted to divination, and their superstitious notions led them to in vent many methods of trial unknown eisewhere.

At a period when most ordeals were falling into disuse, the nobles of Southern Germany established the water ordeal as the mode of deciding doubtful claims on flefs, and in Northern Germany it was instituted for the settlement of conflicting titles

As recently as the beginning of the nineteenth century the populace of Hela, near Dantzig, twice plunged into the sea an old woman reputed to be a sorceress, who; on persistently rising to the surface, was pronounced guilty and beaten to death. Grotius mentions many instances of water ordeal in Bithynia, Sardinia, and other countries, and it was in use in Iceland from a very early period.

In the primitive jurisprudence of i Russia, ordeal by boiling water was enjoined in cases of minor importance. In the eleventh century we find burning iron ordered "where the matter at stake amounted to more than half a grivna of gold."

A curious survival of ordeal superstition prevailed till quite recently in Southern Russia. When a theft was committed in a household the servants were summoned together and a sorceress was sent for. Should no confession be made by the guilty party, the sorceress rolled up as many little balls of thread as there were suspected persons present. She then took one of these balls and, addressing the nearest servant, used this formula: "If you have committed the theft the ball will sink to the bottom of the vase, but if you are innocent it will float on the water." The accuracy of this trial, however was seldom tested. The guilty person usually confessed before his turil




