however, are those which fall into narrow gorges and completely block the course of mountain torrents. The most famous avalanche of the kind was one which fell, early in the nineteenth century, in the upper reaches of the Dranse, blocking the whole valley which descends, like a funnel, to Martigny.

The drying up of the stream in the lower reaches of the valley warned the inhabitants. Engineers were sent for, and an attempt was made to dig a canal through the avalanche and drain the lake. 
