

But often seppuku was the final act in a long-drawn-out feud between families. Then, an insult offered by the head of one to the head of the other meant only one thing - the death of both, each at his own hands The first act in this strange drama was the recital of wrongs by the aggrieved man. Immediately the women of the household set about warding off the evil spirits by girdling the house with lotus plants.

The place of honor was then prepared and the short sword of the victim made ready, and with it a white cloth. The sufferer of the insult then went calmly to meet his death. Kneeling upon an improvised platform, he recited his wrongs, while the attendant priest removed the lotus flower from the shining blade of the wakazashi, or ceremonial sword. The beautiful robe of the victim was then parted, and the




