

But they are remarkably fine specimens, preserved by no attiticial mems, but by a natural process of designation in the dry caves of Vancouver Island. The Mongol mummies will be preserved by the same agency, the dry salt air of the Lacific ocean. The bodies are those of Indians, according to Dr. Orr. who is a noted anthropologist and Indian student. A minute study of their cranial structure has assired him of that. GUARDING BABY PRINCESS

Plainclothesmen Watch Movements of Duke of York's Daughter -Bar Photographers.

The Princess Elizabeth is now among the royal personages in Eng-land who are officially "guarded" by Scotland Yard. The reason of this is that the princess is in the direct line of succession to the throne and according to the rules of the Yard must be guarded.

Every night in the ordinary way Scotland Yard is notified of the movements of the King and Queen, the Prince of Wales and the Duke and Duchess of York for the following day; the movement of the Princess Elizabeth are now included in the note despatched every night from 14. Piccadilly to the Yard by the duke's secretary or equerry.

No special arrangements for "guarding" the princess, however, are made except when she is wheeled out in her "pram" in Hyde Park. When this happens two Yard men are detailed to keep an eye on the princess. Recently a photographer not attached to any paper asked the nurses to allow him to "shoot" the






Upper Left:-Type of airplane that conveyed the flowers to France. Upper Right:-Specimen of the roses from the Pale
