Fish Moths.

Silverfish or fish moths as they are ings, libraries, bake-shops and various other buildings where they may be found in warm moist secluded situations, in and among papers, books, clothing, etc. When disturbed or suddenly exposed to strong light they run rapidly into a place of concealment. Silverfish feed chiefly on starchy materials and glue, and for this reason sometimes cause serious damage to glazed papers and bindings of books. In addition they attack starched clothing and fabrics and feed on dry food stuffs containing starch. They also have been known to remove the paste from behind wall papers causing the latter to peel from the walls.

The Lord Mayor's Chain. The golden chain made of linked S's has been used by London's chief magistate for nearly 400 years.
