unny Sight Is to Watch Antics of a Hypnotized Lobster-Sheds Its Shell Every Six Months.

One of the funniest of sights is to watch the antics of a hypnotized loblobster very quietly and gently stroke its back, it will gambol, standing on head or tail. If you spot a lobster. in its hole under a rock, clap your hands or hit the rock. It will immediately throw off its claws at you to scare you away. Why it should thus dismember itself, for the claws have to be re-grown, is a mystery. Thunder, or, in fact, any loud noise, will make a lobster throw off its

Mrs. Lobster is a wonder. She attaches her eggs to her tail in a marvellous way and carries twelve thousand of them for some months. The ova is deposited in the sand, and there hatched. Once in every twelve months she casts her shell, every part being discarded, claw coverings included: she is left entirely naked, and retires from the world until a new shell is grown. That takes six weeks. The grown male lobster has

to get a new suit every six months. This suit - changing, or moulting, pursues a lobster from its earliest days. Before a lobster is two inches long it has had fourteen suits; when it is six inches in length, it has had twenty: when four years old and ten inches long, it has had twenty-five. I must shed them, or die; its body grows, but its shell-suit is rigid and non-expandable. PROPOSED CALENDAR Long-Vanished Race In Peru Had It

Many Centuries Ago. Those who propose a revised calendar are 4,000 years behind time, according to Prof. Arthur Posnansky, a German authority on obscure civilizations of the ancient world.

On a broad plateau touching the boundary line between Peru and Bolivia and overlooking Titicaca, the largest lake in South America, there lived, 4,000 years ago, a mysterious people who raised enormous temples and adjusted their lives to a calendar of twelve months divided into three ten-day weeks, says Popular Science monthly. The actual calendar as written by the savant priests of the ancient race has been discovered by Prof. Posnansky, who is in Bolivia exploring the relics of the Tiahua-

nacans. The odd days of the year were apparently devoted to holidays or sun worship, the professor says, and the calendar was far more practical than 60 is subject to rough and (O) that of the present day.
