The league leaders and tail-enders met in a twilight Halton County League game at Brampton, when Milton defeated the down-trodden Luckless Flower town boys by the score of 10 to 2. Manager Galloway tried out three juniors for the first five innings. Patterson, Russ Brush and Murray Sprout—"Jim" to baseball and hockey fans—"the youngsters" disappointed themselves in fine style and passed the test with honors and we hope they did as well in their high school exams. Patterson and R. Brush, the battery, held the Bramptonites to two runs and five hits. London and B. Brush worked the last two innings. Fleetfooted B. Brush stole Linton Naylor's thunder of the previous game. Bobby revived that good old game of 4 corners, conceding four hits, scored four runs, drove in four, had four assists and stole four bases. The Milton fielders showed class all the way with Toletka and Anderson deserving special mention. Wheeler, who was given poor support at times, started on the hill-top for the home-sters but his slants proved no mystery to the County Champions who belted his offerings for nine hits and the same number of runs and was relieved by Casey.


