Despite the chilly atmosphere there was a large crowd who yelled themselves hoarse at Alexandria Park, Ottawa, to see Milton take a thorough thumping right on the chin by 11 to 0 in the first game of the second round of the O.B.A.A. play-offs.

The game went better than the final score indicated. According to reports Ottawa played one of the best exhibitions seen locally. They played clever ball all the way, only slipping once on five hits, two walks, a wild pitch and error. They had three home runs, the rough out field accounting for two of them when the ball took bad hops away from the waiting fielders. Another who was the route on the mound pitched steadily. He was no mystery to the Milton batters, they hit his deliveries hard and often but mostly into a fielder's mitt. Fair, waiting fielders made a most peculiar freak catch on A. Clement's long hit. The fielder was beaten all the way but the wind appeared to blow the ball back into the fielder's glove.

In the early stages of the game Milton fought valiantly and certainly went down trying hard. They had not luck but it was all rotten. Milton had nine men left on bases to Ottawa's 2 and the latter club could do no wrong. Ezeard and Patterson, who shared the twirling duties were in the first and fourth for twelve of their runs. Naylor led the batting play of the day, running to deep left to take a hard hit, C. C. Anderson, B. Brush and J. Brush got the loser's six hits evenly divided between them.

The winners only out hit the locals by two blows, eight which were in the first and fourth for twelve of their runs. Milton showed lots of fight. Down twelve runs at one stage of the game they started batting rallies in check the rest of the game and pitched great ball. Naylor led the batting parade with four out of five. The Ottawa players all got hits with the exception of Fair and Peacock. Milton had ten men left on bases and Ottawa nine.
