Halton Live Stock Breeders Prominent at C.N.E.

Halton live stock breeders were again well to the fore at the Canadian National exhibition and many awards returned to this county. In the sheep classes, F. C. Willmott & Son, J. E. McKinnon and Clare Wilson, all of Milton, were prominent, with the former as usual being one of the chief winners in Highlands. This breeder received the coveted female grand championship on one of their ewe lambs. Needless to state, the herds of Duncan Campbell and T. C. Amos, of Moffat, were heavy winners in the Shorthorn classes. The former herd again secured the grand championship on their three-year-old heifer Bellona Princess, and reserve grand on their herd sire Mystic Prince. This animal was bred at Campbell Farms and in the opinion of many on the ringside should have received the championship award over the Jas. Douglas imported sire Edelyn Brown Dale Sultan. Halton Shorthorn Calf club group also maintained the standard set by the older breeders by winning first honors as a group. The group was made up of calves shown by Grant Heslop, Freeman, George Breckon, Bronte, and Donald Lindsay, Georgetown. In the individual class the entry of Grant Heslop was awarded first and he himself was selected as champion showman in the Shorthorn section. Later, in competition with winners from the Ayrshire, Holstein and Jersey sections, he was awarded the reserve championship.

Halton Holstein breeders again had a most creditable display which attracted much interest, both in the ring and in the stable. The exhibit contained animals from the following herds: T. L. Leslie & Son, Albert Hunter, Robinson Bros., J. L. Neelands & Sons, Victor Lawrence, A. E. Woodley & Son, Clarence Anderson, John Hunter, A. Stark & Son, F. Pelletterio & Sons, John Sheehan, and W. B. Somerset. The county herd class which as always was one of the high lights of the show, brought 60 animals into the ring at one time. The Halton herd, which was made up of animals from the first five herds named above, placed fourth out of ten. When it is realized that the Holstein exhibit brought out over 350 head, or more than all other breeds put together, this is indeed a real achievement. In the inter-county calf club exhibit, the Halton group, composed of Bruce Reid and Lyle and Russell Dales, made a creditable showing by placing third, with seven counties competing.

Unfortunately, we were not able to see all the agricultural features of the big fair, but we did note that Halton was well represented in Jerseys by Baronston Farm, Georgetown; in Percherons by Hugh Rodney and the Clarence Gundy estate; in Thoroughbreds by Dr. Cecil Heslop, and in Guernseys by Geo. King & Sons, Oakville.

This resume would not be complete without some reference to field crops and fruit. Here again Halton exhibitors won many awards. Numbered among these were the fine displays of apples from the orchards of Colin and W. L. Smith, Burlington, and G. R. Breckon, Bronte. The Essex Agricultural society in strong competition upheld the name of Essex township as an outstanding seed growing centre by placing second with their display of grains and third with sheaves.

In the junior judging competitions Halton was not as largely represented as usual, owing to the epidemic of infantile paralysis in Toronto. Nevertheless, those who were present in their presence known in uncertain manner. In heavy horses, Lloyd Chisholm, Milton, was first, and Jack Turner, Acton, was seventh. In dairy cattle, Craig Reid and Bruce Reid placed second and ninth, respectively. In poultry, Jack Taylor, of Freeman, was first, and in sheep, George Breckon was twelfth. In the girls' department the names of Isabel Tovell, Palermo; Alma Marsh, Milton, and Betty Rivaz, Palermo, were prominent among the prize winners.

To all Halton breeders and competitors mentioned and any others we may have overlooked, may we extend our congratulations not only on the honor they brought to themselves, but to the county as a whole.

When Water Freezes

When water freezes the ice has a volume about 9 per cent larger than that of the water from which it was formed. If water fills, or nearly fills, a closed space, and is allowed to freeze, the ice which forms will have a larger volume than the water, and as a result a pressure tending to burst the container will develop. The pressure which may be developed increases about 30,000 pounds in change of temperature from 32 degrees Fahrenheit to minus 8 degrees Fahrenheit. If the container is strong enough to withstand a pressure in excess of 30,000 pounds per square inch or can stretch enough to increase about 9 per cent in volume, it will not burst, even if subjected to a very low temperature, says the United States Bureau of Standards.

Red Tires Soldiers

At the beginning of the present century, the British army learned a great deal about the effect of color on human beings. For one thing, it found that on long marches regiments in red uniforms became fatigued more quickly than those in gray or green. A line of brightly uniformed men tired the eyes of those walking behind. Moreover, they appeared too conspicuously against the landscape. That is why olive-drab or khaki became the color for fighting armies all over the world.

No Policy, No Fighters

Old English fire insurance companies used to place marks on the houses they had insured, and to employ their own brigades for fire fighting, says Clive Rouse in his Old Towns of England. By the company's mark they could see whether they were wasting their energies on property insured by some other company.
