They have readily adapted themselves to their new homes and without doubt have a new outlook on life. The interest and co-operation of the foster mothers is very encouraging and with their assistance we feel the children are on their way to becoming useful citizens.

Separation of parents is still one of the large factors in respect to neglected children. Even with increased employment the child is too often the last consideration of the parent.

The unmarried mother and her child is also one of the big problems of the society and practically no change is noted in this regard from year to year.

**THE OLD ORDER CHANGETH**

The Orillia News-Letter comments that present day elections are not as exciting as they used to be, and points out that this is possibly due to the fact that few newspapers are to-day partisan in their outlook. We believe, with Midland Free Press, that the day has gone by when the public are interested in what one editor, has to say about the other. Once upon a time newspapers rivalled the politicians in throwing mud at one another. The politicians are still at it, but the editors have discovered that there are plenty of other things much more worthwhile doing.

The News-Letter has this to say of former times: "Those were the days when people generally were more partisan in their views. They were carried in the Griffe or the Evening Tories. 'Changeovers' were nothing less than traitors. To-day, as shown by frequent sweeping changes in election results, the 'changeovers' or independents as they are now called, are the majority. It is the same with the newspapers, like individuals, like to be free from political partisanship and in a position where they can honestly condemn or commend any political legislation they see fit on its merits without regard to which party brought it about."

**President of Borden Co. Dead**

New York, Oct. 12.—It was announced to-day that Arthur W. Milburn, president of the Borden Company, had died yesterday at Baden, Baden, Germany, of pneumonia.

Mr. Milburn, who was elected president of the Borden Company in 1917, was born in Haverstraw, N. Y., in 1874. He joined the Borden Co. in 1894, after three years with the Ansonia Creek Company. He became the Borden treasurer in 1907, and a director in 1911.

He is survived by Mrs. Milburn, one son, Arthur, M. A. New York broker, and two daughters, Miss Francis J. Milburn, of New York, and Mrs. A. R. Connelly, of New Canaan, Conn.
