

D. a residence for the pope was built on the site of the regular group of palaces, courts, chapels, and offices covering 131/2 scripts, many of priceless value. The art treasures, both paintings and sculpture, are beyond price, and there are two large museums.

under the sovereignty of the pope.

300 persons out of every 100,000 then living, died annually from this disease.
