Florence May Bradley Hall, daughter of the late John and Mrs. Bradley, of Milton, died of accidental drowning on May 16th, while canoeing on the Red Deer River, near the Municipal Hospital, Drumheller, Alberta, of which she was night superintendent. She spent her childhood in Milton, then went west and trained for a nurse in Saskatoon Hospital, where she graduated with honors before her twenty first birthday.
