Change in Leadership May Change Leafs' Luck

Elevation of Jack Burns to Role of Manager Gives Dan Howley Chance to Seek Players to Strengthen the Team

With Irving John Burns, first baseman, at the helm as playing manager, and Daniel Philip Howley devoting his whole time to front office problems such as the acquisition of players to strengthen the team, the Toronto Maple Leafs have occasion to feel optimistic over the remaining two months of the International League campaign.

The recent changes did not bring about an immediate evacuation of the lowly position occupied by the Leafs in the league standing, but, in their brief home stand following the three-week trip on the road, the players demonstrated that they are capable of playing crowd-pleasing baseball.

Rain washed out two of the seven games of their home stay and added to the number of double-headers later on, but in the five games played, the Leafs won three, two of them in extra innings.

Burns' popularity with Toronto fans is firmly established, and he appears to have all the requirements of a good leader on the field.

His elevation to the managerial position might have proved more auspicious, however, had not a couple of incidents occurred to injure the Leafs.

Bill Urbanaki, whose batting and fielding had improved considerably over his early season showing, was forced to the sidelines with a torn muscle in his back.

Helme Manush, veteran outfielder, who was batting leader of the team, was called away to his home in Tusculuma, Alabama, owing to the death of his mother.

The absence of these two players for over ten days dealt the Toronto team a real blow at a time when it was making a strong bid to improve its position in the league.

Meanwhile, Dan Howley has been contacting several major league clubs in an effort to fortify the Leafs with more batting strength.

Howley seeks an outfielder or two, preferably right hand batters. Such players are scarce, at least players of international league calibre.

One of the Leafs' difficulties this season has been the large number of left hand batsmen in the line-up.

The present home stand of the Leafs will last until July 28, with a gap of two days, July 24 and 25, when they play in Rochester.

Following the series against Newark which began in Toronto on July 8, the Leafs oppose Syracuse, Jersey City, Baltimore and Montreal at Maple Leaf stadium.

There will be twilight flood-light double-headers on Saturday, July 16, against Jersey City, and Saturday, July 23, against Montreal.

These Saturday evening twin bills are proving popular in Toronto, and also attracting many people from outside of Toronto.

There will be a mid-week twilight-floodlight double bill against Baltimore on Wednesday evening, July 20.

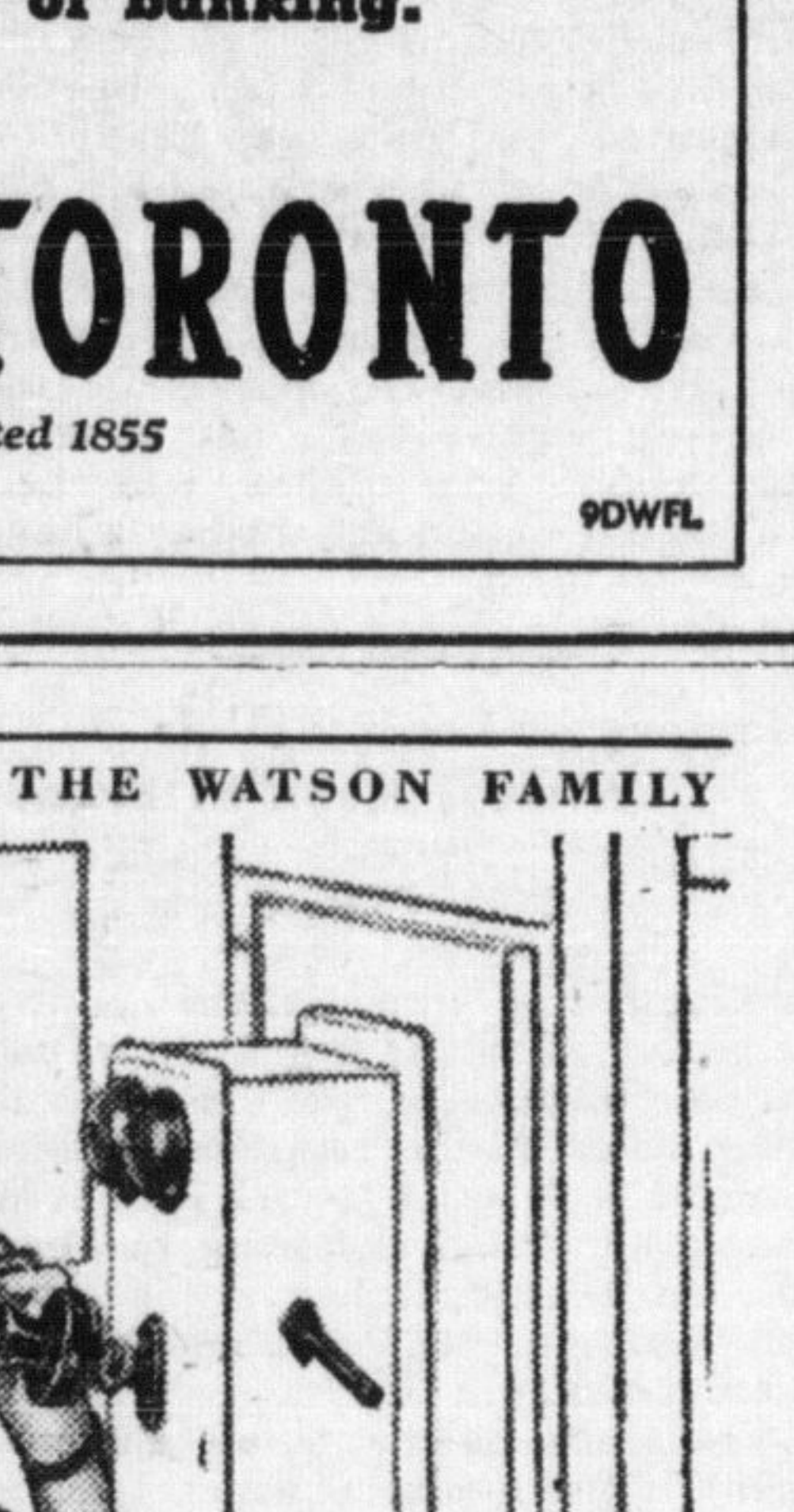
