Miss Edith Hopkins, from the Women's Institute Branch of the Department of Agriculture expressed great pleasure at the quality of work exhibited, which she also thought reflected greatly to the efficiency of the local actors for the way in which they had ridged the information given to them at the training classes.

The Summary Day was well attended and a great deal of work was displayed. Nine branches took up project work and eight completed the course. In the exhibit were fifteen pieced quilts, one appliqued, 11 tufted spreads and eight Italian quilted cushions. In knitting there were nine pairs of socks, eight pairs of gloves and nine pairs of mitts. There were also nine wool hats.

Mrs. J. E. Gamble, District President, took charge of the meeting and local talent was responsible for an enjoyable program. Local leaders also spoke briefly, expressing satisfaction at the cooperation given them by the members of the W. I., all of whom they felt had found the work enjoyable and instructive.
