Already Canada is paying a lower interest on its total national debt than Australia is paying, even after the forcible reduction. The average interest rate which Canada is paying on all its national debt is 3.67%, which is the lowest rate of any nation in the Mother Land, and is within one tenth of one per cent, of the rate being paid by the United Kingdom.
