#### Registration of Revolvers and Pistols

According to the provisions of th Criminal Code all owners of revolvers and pistols are required to register them with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, Ottawa, between the first day of March and the first day of July, 1939, and during the same period every five years thereafter. Registration certificates previously issued have now expired.

Eyeryone is guilty of an offence and liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding fifty dollars or to imprisonment for a period not exceeding thirty days, or to both fine and imprisonment, who has in his possession a pistol or revolver without having registered the same.

Application for the registration revolvers and pistols may be made the Ontario Provincial Police and the Chief Constable of every city, town o
