H. S. INSPECTOR'S REPORT

Extracts from the report of Inspector A. J. Husband on his visit to Milton High School:
The accommodations are in good repair and suitably decorated. The former garage is continued for the current school year. Adequate provision is made for teaching the subjects of Grades IX and X with the exception of Shop Work and Home Economics, which are not taught. The usual subjects of the senior grades are taught, including the contents of the courses for thirteen Upper School papers, was pleasingly found that music is taught in the Middle School as well as in Grades IX and X. Number pupils enrolled 174: 76 boys and 98 girls.

Although the school has lost three good teachers through retirement of Miss Anderson, Miss Wickert and Mr. Little, the staff remains a reasonably strong one. Miss Kennedy and Mr. Kenney, who joined the staff in September, bring to the school a wealth of a good beginning and give promise of becoming very efficient teachers. Miss Proud, who has had some years' successful experience, is doing good work in her subjects. The teaching of the other members of the staff is well and favorably known and continue to be good or excellent. The reading, spelling and writing of most of the pupils in Grade IX are above the average. As regular instruction is given in all these subjects, the pupils should continue to make progress in them. The work in all the subjects of study should contribute something to the improvement of the pupils' standing in these special subjects. Good work is being done in Business Practice and Writing. I have suggested more frequent practice in writing. The new course in Art is being followed and the pupils appear to be interested in it. Some good work from a creative point of view has been done. The records of practical and experimental work in Science is satisfactory. The classes appear to be making satisfactory progress in all the subject of study. The people of Milton and surrounding country have reason to be satisfied with the work that the High School is doing in bringing the benefit of secondary education to their home. Any visitor to it would be impressed by the seriousness of purpose that seems to mark every phase of its work, as well as by the commendable bearing of the pupils toward their teachers, and in relation to one another. Much credit for this must be given to the wise administration of its affairs by Principal Macleod. The enrollment is somewhat higher this year and necessitated the employment of an additional teacher. The Board was fortunate in securing Miss Lewis, who gave the school good service a few years ago. The attention is fairly evenly distributed among the grades and all the classes are of a reasonable size. This is important as very large classes frequently result in discouragement on the part of the weaker pupils and also in retardation which adds to the cost of education. All classes appear to be making satisfactory progress in their studies, and unless some serious interruption of the work occurs, the good results achieved during the past year should be repeated at the next Departmental examinations.
